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Contract Work Module Methodology

The Contract Work Module, sponsored by the Upjohn Institute and the University of Maryland, was a set of questions carried on the Gallup Daily Education poll on four separate occasions in 2018 and 2019. Each wave consisted of 15,000 interviews with U.S. adults ages 18-80.

The field dates for the four modules were:

May 14-June 12, 2018 Aug. 13-Sept. 11, 2018 Nov. 19-Dec. 16, 2018 Feb. 25-March 27, 2019

Gallup interviewers conducted all interviews by telephone on weekday evenings and weekend afternoons. Interviews were primarily conducted in English, but respondents who preferred to be were interviewed in Spanish.

Gallup used a dual-frame Random Digit Dial (RDD) sample obtained from Survey Sampling International, with approximately 70% of the sample consisting of cellular telephone numbers and 30% consisting of landline telephone numbers. Cellphone interviews were conducted with the person answering the cellphone on the assumption that cellphones are personal devices. Landline interviews were conducted with a randomly selected household member (the person having the next birthday) on the assumption that landline phones are shared devices. A minimum of three attempts were made to each sampled telephone number. The call attempts were varied across days of the week and times of the evening/day to maximize the likelihood a respondent could be reached.

The sample was ordered proportionately by time zone within a U.S. census region, and interviewing quotas were set to make sure the completed interviews were also done proportionately by time zone and region. These quotas were set on a weekly basis with interviewing "weeks" beginning on Mondays and ending on Sundays. Weekly time zone by region quotas were as follows:

Note: Geographies that fall outside the dominant time zone within region groupings are assigned to the next closest group — Midwest/Mountain is assigned to Midwest/Central, South/Mountain is assigned to South/Central and Alaska and Hawaii to West/Pacific.

The module took an average of 3.5 minutes to complete for contract workers, and an average of 1.2 minutes to complete for all 18- to 80-year-old adults. The entire Daily Education poll averages 12-14 minutes overall.

The estimated response rates are below. Because the Daily Education poll (on which the Contract Work questions were asked) involved continuous interviewing throughout the year, it is not possible to compute precise response rates for the Contract Work Module interviewing waves. However, reasonable estimates can be computed by isolating the days on which the Contract Work Module ran and computing response rates for those days. Sample records that were first dialed on days prior to when a new Contract Work Module wave started, or that were first dialed during the Contract Work field period but not fully resolved until after it finished, are not included in the computations.¹

Gallup weighted the obtained data to compensate for stratified sample selection probabilities, within-household selection, dual-frame (landlines and cellphones) sample design overlap and nonresponse. Additionally, Gallup post-stratified the data to match the demographic profile of U.S. adults ages 18-80 years old with targets from the U.S. Census Bureau's most recent Current Population Survey on age, gender, census region, education, ethnicity and race.³

¹ The exclusion of these cases (less than 10% of completes) likely has minimal effect on the computed rates. See the Appendix for more detail.

² One distinguishing feature of the AAPOR-RR-III rate is it attempts to estimate eligibility rates for sampled households or individuals that cannot be reached. This is done to avoid overestimating the response rate (by assuming all who are not reached are ineligible) or underestimating it (assuming all who are not reached are eligible). This rate assumes the eligibility rates are the same for households and individuals who cannot be reached as they are for those who are contacted and screened for eligibility. Given the sample frame for the study was ages 18-80, the eligibility rate was high, and thus factoring in eligibility rates for unreachable households and individuals has little practical impact on the rates. ³ The March 2017 CPS was used for Waves 1 through 3 and the March 2018 CPS was used for Wave 4.

The samples were also post-stratified on population density using data from the 2010 Census based on respondents' self-reports of location (from their zip code, rolled up to their county). Gallup created population density weighting targets by dividing the U.S. population into equal quintiles. The 20% of Americans residing in the most densely-populated counties (based on total county population divided by county land area, representing 60 counties) are assigned to the top quintile, the 20% of Americans living in the next most densely-populated counties (representing 98 counties) are assigned to the second quintile, and so on. Gallup then weights the sample to ensure that the weighted proportion of the sample living in each population density quintile is equal to 20%.

Gallup also weighted the data to match national targets of phone status such as cellphone only, landline only and dual user (subdivided into dual users who mostly use their cellphone vs. all other dual users) based on the latest estimates from the most recent National Health Interview Survey.⁴

Questions were generally standard for all four waves with few exceptions. All survey questions were pre-tested in cognitive interviews and revised based on feedback received from those interviews.

Some questions had two versions with slightly different wordings, with each version randomly assigned to half the sample.
