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The W.E. Upjohn Institute for Employment Research invites submissions for its 25th annual prize for the best PhD dissertation on employment-related issues.

A first prize of \$2,500 is being offered. Up to two honorable mention awards of \$1,000 may also be given.

The Institute supports and conducts policy-relevant research on issues related to employment, unemployment, and social insurance programs. The dissertation award furthers this mission. The dissertation may come from any academic discipline, but it must have a substantial policy thrust.

Dissertations will be evaluated by a panel of economists using the following criteria:

- **Policy relevance**
- **Technical quality of the research**
- **Presentation**

Any person whose dissertation has been accepted during the 24-month period from July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2019 is eligible for the 2019 prize. **The deadline for submission is July 5, 2019.** Applicants must send a 10-page summary of the dissertation, CV, and a letter of endorsement from their dissertation advisor to the following address:
